### The Impact of Youth Homelessness



- 2.5 million children are homeless in the United States
- 1.3 million homeless youth were enrolled in LEAs as McKinney-Vento eligible during School Year 2012-2013 which was an 8% increase from 2011-2012
- Families with children account for 30% of the total homeless population in the United States
- The number of people in poor households living doubled up with family and friends increased in 24 states from 2012 to 2013
- In Georgia the number of individuals doubled up with family and friends increased 8.3% from 2012 to 2013




#### Col·lab·o·ra·tion

### Effective Collaboration...



- Provides a more systematic, comprehensive approach to addressing student needs
- Accomplishes what individual staff members cannot tackle alone
- Prevents duplication of individual or organizational efforts
- Enhances the power of advocacy and resource development for Homeless Education programs
- Creates enhanced public recognition and visibility for LEAs, student achievement, and community partners

Georgia's School Superintendent
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
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- United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) is an independent Federal agency, represented by the heads of 19 Federal departments and agencies.
- In 2010 USICH issued Opening Doors: The Federal Strategic Plan on Preventing and Ending Homelessness
- Opening Doors has established the goal of ending youth homelessness by 2020
- In 2012 USICH adopted a Framework to End Youth Homelessness

## Why are Collaborative Partnerships Beneficial?



- Parents need multiple sources of support to help their children succeed in school and in their communities
- Research demonstrates that effective schools and education-focused programs have higher levels of parental and community involvement
- Collaboration with community partners builds awareness of homeless education and the needs of McKinney-Vento students
- Creation of LEA consortiums for Homeless Education enhances the quality of services provided to students and families





- Partnership with local churches, Lion's Club, school counselors and teachers
- Program provides adult size jeans to high school students
- Funding source: Community Partners



  - Collaborative works to identify the needs of McKinney-Vento students, and partners participate in annual EHCY Needs Assessment



- "Prom-A-Paloosa"
  - Partnership with Community Christian Counsel, West Georgia Technical College, local radio station, Waco Baptist Church, community volunteers, teachers and counselors
  - Organizations donated hair styling, shoes, flowers, jewelry, dresses, tuxedos, items for a silent auction, alterations, fees, dues and tickets for 50 students going to prom, military ball or 8th grade dance
  - Funding source: community partners, teachers, staff and volunteers

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
## Strategies for Developing Meaningful Collaborative Partnerships

### **Engaging Community Partners**



- Learn and consider the impact of the varying definitions of homelessness
- Develop MOUs for cooperation and information sharing
- Create opportunities for open discussion about shared values and gaps in service
- Identify community stakeholders to serve as partners in activities that advance common values and goals

### **Engaging Community Partners**




- Collaborate in the development of a Homeless Education Advisory Committee with community partners
- Engage LEA administrators and stakeholders in a 30-60-90 day plan to improve Homeless Education collaborative partnerships
- Conduct an annual stakeholder survey to evaluate the effectiveness of programs and partnerships
