Title I, Parental Involvement



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Provide parents with **timely information** about Title I programs

Each school receiving Title I funds shall jointly develop with, and distribute to, parents a written parental involvement policy

Conduct an annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of the parental involvement policy to improve the academic quality

improve the academic quality

Parental Involvement Building Capacity



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Ensure that information related to school and parent programs, meetings, and other activities is sent to the parents in a format and, to the extent practicable, in a language the parents can understand

Provide assistance to parents in understanding such topics as the State's academic content standards and State student academic achievement standards, State and local academic assessments, Title I requirements, and how to monitor a child's progress

Parental Involvement Building Staff Capacity



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Educate faculty and staff, with the assistance of parents, in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, implement and coordinate parent programs, and build ties between parents and the school;

POLICY AND PROGRAM GOALS

- To build and enhance the capacity of staff/families in the "4 C" areas:
- Capabilities (skills and knowledge)
- Connections (networks)
- Cognition (beliefs, values)
- Confidence (self-efficacy)

Let's THINK about Scaffolding Richard Woods. Georgia's School Superintendent "Educating Georgia's Future" gadoe.org ^{rearner's} Knowledge and Skill⁵ Fnowledge and Skills That Can Be Learned from Others (Zone of Proximal Development)

Scaffolding is considered a way to *close the gap* between what the student *must learn* and the *skill level* of that learner

Vygotsky, L. (1978). "Interaction between learning and development."



If educators recognize where a parent or a gadoe.org group of parents fall within a Zone of Proximal Communication, wouldn't they then be able to scaffold the type, the method, the content and amount of information sent home in a more purposeful and effective way?

- Update frequently!


Google Drive

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What can you do in Google Drive?




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- Collect parent contact information or survey results by using Google forms – which automatically exports to a Google spreadsheet.
- Create and send engaging enewsletters directly to e-mail lists created through Google Spreadsheets
- Share student information with parents (ex- behavior or progress logs)
- Share presentations
- Electronically coordinate parent conference sign-ups
- Create shared school/classroom calendars
